## YESHIVA COLLEGE BELIEF & RELIGIOUS COMMITMENT

Our primary concern in this course will be to examine certain issues and texts relating to the nature of belief, its place and significance in human thought in general, with special regard to religious commitment. We shall read texts, and call upon methods of thought, belonging to the disciplines of Western philosophy, intellectual history, theology, and literature (possibly cognitive psychology as well). Though unable to undertake a study of all the pertinent facets of thought, or even to exhaust one specific discipline, we shall, I hope, hit several of the high points of the subject and, if successful, learn something about the manner in which one may integrate various disciplines.

Writing: There will be frequent assignments (about 15-20 pages in all). I must insist on promptness in handing them in.

## I will try to arrange additional "office hours" via Zoom, most likely on Sundays late afternoon or Friday—once day gets longer.
