## JACOB H. SCHIFF AS I KNEW HIM

Jacob H. Schiff represented a type of Jew very rare in our days. He had been reared in the atmosphere of Rabbi Samson Ralphael Hirsch and Jewish tradition to him was not a congenital burden, but a source of spiritual enrichment and joy. I recall a visit to his office in 1920 in the company of my sainted father and what he then said about his appreciation of genuine orthodoxy and of Jews who in life and letters live up to the tenets of the Torah, has remained an impressive memory.

#### "SYMPHONY OF GOODNESS"

His life reads like a symphony of goodness. Like Abraham of old, he did not wait for the cry of poverty to reach him, but he went forth like the patriarch, in heat and cold with utter disregard of inconvenience and discomfort to meet his brethren in distress, to develop for them institutions of public righteousness, to take care of the sick, the poor, and the underprivileged. His ricnes did not dazzle him. His sense of justice endowed him with courage to face difficult situations and to assert the principles of Judaism against any outside pressure. Without aspiring to it, he continued in America the tradition of the Rochschilds of England and France, of Baron Maurice de Hirsch. He has established for himself a memory stronger than brass in the hearts of Jews of every shade of religious opinion, and as the years roll on he gains in stature.

#### CHALLENGE TO LEADERSHIP

The excess energy represented by the two million of New York Jewry with too generous a margin for the display of selfishness, vain glory, and organized cupidity, he envisaged as a supreme challenge to Jewish leadership. Hence his painstaking interest and his broad devotion to the effort to comprehend these two million in a Kehilah, which would relegate each particular aspect and functions to the men most fitted and would reach through organized effort the individual, interpreting his problems and developing for him channels of communication with the rest of Jewry and a way-out from the cul de sac of Israel in the American scene.

Constructive giving has been a time-hallowed idea in Israel. Lending to the poor before they are fallen, sustaining a man in his time of crisis so as to enable him to retain his self-respect, and to work out by brain or brawn his economic salvation, has been ancient Torah in Israel. It was in accord with this timeless ideal of our people that Jacob H. Schiff lent the prestige of his name and the power of his wealth to the Hebrew Free Loan Society, an organization more blessed in its blessing for the poor and near-poor of the city than any other institution.

Interdenominational in his sympathies, international in his benefactions, he allowed no tariff to human consideration, and in accord with the Shulchan Aruch, he too took care of the sick, the forlorn, the hopeless among Jew and non-Jew alike, endowing institutions, schools, and homes of the spirit.

#### TRIED TO STOP WAR

He reached his full stature in his attempt to stop the madness of the last war. It was Israel-Zangwill, before whom men of wealth were as or no account and leaders of the communities but targets of his scorn, who honored himself by a famous letter that appeared in the London Times in which he vigorously defended Jacob H. Schiff against the insinuation that his effort on behalf of peace may have been due to a German super-patriotism. Jacob H. Schiff, in his international aspect, could not be described more tersely than in the phrase of Israel Zangwill: "He speaks not us the mouthpiece of Potsdam, but with the voice of Jerusalem."

#### THE ABRAHAMIC PROMISE

Jacob H. Schiff was also ambassador extraordinary to the non-Jews, not by popular election, nor by political appointment, but by the color and tenor of his public benefactions. Within his opportunities he strove wholeheartedly, consistently, and successfully to make true the Abrahamic promise that it is the task of the Jew. his privilege and his duty, to be a blessing to the nations of the world. In that respect, Jacob H. Schiff combined the traditions of the past with the keen awareness of the duties of the present, inspired by the promise of a future in which man will not war against his fellow, but will realize there is no securer foundation of peace and harmony than that we all remain our brother's keeper.

## 15th Anniversary of the death of JACOB H. SCHIFF

Commemorated in the

Ohab Zedek, West 116th Street Synagogue October 7, 1935, at the Yom Kippur Memorial Service.

Before the recitation of the prayer by Rabbi Herman Klein and the chanting of "El Mole Rachmim" by Cantor Emil Welss, assisted by a choir under the direction of Max Grossman, Mr. Morris Engelman, Chairman of the 116th Street Synagogue, delivered the following tribute to the memory of Jacob H. Schiff:

"According to the Jewish Calendar, Tishri 13 falls on October 10th this year marks the 15th Anniversary of the death of Jacob H. Schiff, renowned American Jewish leader."

"I am glad to join in paying my humble tribute along with that of all those who are left to guard this beautiful synagogue, of which the late Jacob H. Schiff laid the cornerstone in November 1906. It comes to mind that when the World War started, it was the late Dr. Philip Klein who made the first war relief appeal in this synagogue, in which Mr. Schiff took such an active part and in which I had the privilege of working with him, as well as on other appeals during his lifetime."

When the ravages of the World War had blighted the hopes of so many millions in Europe, leaders in many walks of Jewish life in America who were deeply moved by the dire needs of their brethren abroad, organized the Joint Distribution Committee. They were bound together in unity by a great ideal, an ideal of service for suffering mankind.

One cannot estimate the significance and value of the great work performed by this Committee for the Jews abroad. They sent over shiploads of food and clothing, medicines, sent curiers to re-unite families. Jewish homes were gladened again with Kosher meat and fat, with flour and matzos. They sent nurses and doctors and built hospitals. They established homes for the needy aged and children. They set up banks, co-operatives and loan kassas to help the Jewish business-man and farmer and they gave huge sums for the re-building of houses and aided war prisoners to return to their homes. And they helped to support Synagogues and Yeshivas, to keep alive the great traditions of our religion, irrespective of their affiliations. Palestine is today a land of beauty and comfort, but in the days of its infancy the Joint Distribution Committee had such difficult work to perform to root out malaria blight which oppressed that country.

Much labor and many great personal sacrifices have gone into this wonderful work of the Joint Distribution Committee. Those earlier leaders, now at rest, toiled unceasingly to alleviate the distress of their brethren overseas. And those who guide it now spare no effort to bring succor and the light of hope to the suffering Jewish hearts in the Europe of today.

"Mr. Schiff, through his activities, earliched not only Jewish life but American life as well. It is therefore fitting that a memorial to be erected in the form of a Schiff Memorial Fund to aid Jewish social educational and religious institutions throughout the world, and thereby to perpetuate his name for generations to come. I feel that many people can be found who will each of them contribute or collect a substantial sum to establish a Fund, to be known as the Joint Gemilath Chesed Loan Fund, which should embrace the construction of a building for the purpose of centralizing all Jewish communal affairs, and to be called the Schiff Memorial Building, with a gallery dedicated to Jewish American veterans of the World War."

"I recall with a feeling of reverence that when I returned from Europe, in May 1819, I reported to Mr. Warburg on the needs of European Jewry in the presence of Mr. Schiff, and he said that he was too old to carry out my recommendations, but suggested that Mr. Warburg do it. As a result thereof, the \$5,000,000. Reconstruction Fund was established, and Col. Herbert H. Lehman, the present Governor of the State of N. Y. was elected Chairman. Couriers were sent abroad to unite wardisrupted families and over \$1,000,000 worth of kosher meat and fat were sent abroad. This joint fund suggested today should be under the supervision of the J.D.C.'s Cultural Committee, 7 Hanover Street, N. Y. of which Dr. Cyrus Adler is Chairman and which represents all sectors of Jews in America.
