SCHOLARSHIP



Marlene R. Schiffman, Catalog Librarian, presented "From Piecemeal to Proactive: Cataloging Theses and Dissertations at Yeshiva University" at the SUNY Librarians Association Annua Conference on June 20, 2022.

AWARDS & GRANTS

- LYRASIS Ideas Award for textbook alternatives in-kind support came to completion with faculty members and academic librarians from four other institutions: Lake Sumter State College, Northern Virginia Community College, Ohio Wesleyan University, and University of Louisiana Monroe. Yeshiva University participants are Paul Glassman, Director of Scholarly and Cultural Resources and Adjunct Instructor of Architectural History and Design, Art Department, Yeshiva College; Elinor Grumet, Reference and Instruction Librarian, Hedi Steinberg Library; Sandy Moore, Head Librarian, Pollack Library; Lauren Fitzgerald, Professor, Department of English, Yeshiva College; Matt Miller, Associate Professor, Department of English, Stern College for Women; and Nora Nachumi, Associate Professor, Department of English, Stern College for Women. In partnership with their campus librarians, faculty members curated openaccess and library-licensed materials to replace costly textbooks in a fall 2021 course. They also explored whether use of these resources leads to new pedagogical strategies in the classroom.
- The **Estate of Herman Prinz Salomon** awarded funds to provide access to create and edit descriptive records for a multi-language Judaica collection.

The Zoltan Erenyi Fund made three noteworthy gifts via the Jewish Communal Fund:

- In memory of Leah Adler for rare materials in Hebraica-Judaica
- To upgrade group study rooms for screen sharing with collaboration software and hardware in Pollack and Hedi Steinberg Libraries.

LIBRARY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The committee, with faculty, student, and university administration representatives, met twice and made recommendations on equipment, acquisitions, programs, and services. Professor Aaron

Koller resigned after serving on the committee since its 2016 inception. Professor Avraham Ravid will succeed him as representative of undergraduate faculty members.

POLLACK LIBRARY

- Several QR code events helped students re-acclimate to the library on return to campus after COVID closure.
- New research guides support Katz School programs.
- Implementation of Reference Tracker increases understanding of how, where, and when students receive assistance from libraries' personnel.
- An electronic group study room reservation system allows students to reserve rooms in advance.
- All group study rooms were equipped with flatscreen monitors allow students to connect their laptop computers to the screen for collaboration with their peers.
- 2022 Student Library Research Award winner was Samuel Friedman for "The Differing Effects of Narrative Transportation Across Animated and Live Action Movies," written for Professor Anna-Lisa Cohen's Experimental Psychology course.
- Library Research Guides serve as information pathfinders for students and faculty members. The five guides with the most views are Google Scholar, YU Student Library Research Award, Social Work Research Guide, Library Research Jump Start, and Ancient Jewish History.

MENDEL GOTTESMAN LIBRARY

Collecting Activity

- Comprehensive acquisition of rabbinica continues to be a focus.
- Niche Jewish newspapers and magazines highlighting diverse communities within North America also distinguish the collection.
- Significant efforts this year included making hidden collections searchable.

Significant Gift

The estate of Herman Prinz Salomon, professor emeritus at SUNY Albany, donated works on the western Sephardi Jewish community of Amsterdam. Highlights include significant liturgical works.

Research Support

- Through cooperation with the Fish Center for Holocaust and Genocide Studies and the Benjamin N. Cardozo School of Law library, the library acquired the Shoah Visual History Archive, which focuses on videorecorded testimonies.
- Production of a Holocaust research guide focused on electronic and print resources both within Yeshiva University Libraries and externally.

Philanthropic Support

The Zoltan Erenyi Fund continued its support of acquisitions in memory of Leah Adler and Zoltan Erenyi. New acquisitions include *Takanoth HaKehillah* (regulations governing the administration of the Ashkenazi community of Amsterdam), *Album of Tel Aviv Views* (1926), and photographic portraits of Lithuanian Rabbis.

Instruction

Librarians delivered sessions to Bernard Revel Graduate School for Jewish Studies doctoral students, Fish Center Holocaust and Genocide Studies graduate students, and select undergraduate classes.

HEDI STEINBERG LIBRARY

Acquisitions

The library accepted a gift of collection of Jewish cookbooks.

Outreach to faculty

- *Choice* reviews for collection development recommendations are now sent electronically.
- A welcome letter sent to faculty each semester results directly in requests for research instruction.

Outreach to students

- Students are donating used textbooks for addition to the reserve collection.
- Campus guides were provided a script with talking points during prospective students' tours.
- Library staff members now have a fact sheet for interaction with prospective students during campus tours.
- At the Success Fair, over 85 students interacted with staff members at the library table, where they received branded water bottles, fast facts. As entertainment, library-centric cartoons were on view on a laptop computer.
- Library Associate Emily Apterbach arranged with students to cosponsor a book club and for librarians to serve as mentors for the coming year.

Collection management

- The library launched a substantial de-selection project and enrolled faculty members in the process. 150 boxes of de-selected material were sent to Better World Books for distribution in developing countries.
- Previously uncataloged reserve titles and copies were added to the online public access catalog, YULIS.

Facilities

 Staff members rearranged the second-floor study room so that the print station would be easier for patrons to use and the study area more accessible. • Reference and Instruction Librarian Hindishe Lee surveyed signage for improved wayfinding.

Instruction

- Research and Instruction Librarian Rina Krautwirth extended the prior year's experimental
 program in flipping the classroom—assigning an online tutorial and exercise before the session.
 She also created a research guide for psychology.
- Reference and Instruction Librarian Hindishe Lee composed and posted guides to e-mailing and printing from e-books PowerPoint and to working with the database *Chronicling America*.

Professional Service

- Rina Krautwirth, Research and Instruction Librarian, continues as President of Association of Jewish Libraries/New York Metropolitan Area (AJL/NYMA).
- Hallie Cantor, Acquisitions Associate, continues as editor and chief author of the AJL/NYMA Newsletter, co-hosted Library Book Talks, and contributed articles to the staff newsletter, YAIR, and the library blog.

ARCHIVES & SPECIAL COLLECTIONS

Reference

Reference interactions are primarily remote. Staff members continued to digitize material for offsite patrons.

COVID Project

Staff members continued collecting, processing, organizing, and tracking COVID material and worked on the backlog with the help of students. Staff members took web archiving classes to gain additional familiarity with web archiving tools and processes.

Exhibits

Curator Shulamith Berger installed material on J.D. [Judah David] Eisenstein, known as *Ba'al Ha-Otsarot*, the Master of the Treasuries, for his compendia of Jewish law, lore, and literature. The library lent rare Jewish Cultural Reconstruction books and archival material to the Jewish Museum exhibit *Afterlives: Recovering the Lost Stories of Looted Art*.

Visits

A. Richard and Adam Parkoff viewed their manuscripts and rare books, which are on long-term loan.

Cataloging

Cataloging of rare and archival acquisitions made with the Leah Adler Memorial Fund required collaboration with Mendel Gottesman Library and Metadata Services to organize workflow.

Digital Projects

- 1,400 Institutional/West Side Institutional Synagogue bulletins were digitized and added to the New York Synagogues Bulletins Collection. The remaining manuscripts which were digitized by Ardon bar Hama were uploaded to Islandora.
- Staff members collaborated with METRO in its migration of the Student Struggle for Soviet Jewry Poster Collection from Islandora to Archipelago.
- JSTOR harvested the Libraries' Digital Collections and YAIR material into its digital platform.
- ITHAKA's Reveal Digital agreed to digitize portions of the Student Struggle for Soviet Jewry collection, which will be mounted on their website. The microfilms are currently at the vendor.

Other Projects

- Collaboration with the Lamm family on a digital repository of Norman Lamm's collections.
- Application to the Lucius Littauer Foundation for a grant to digitize the Ladino book collection.
- Created and distributed a survey to library staff members about digitization equipment and needs.

Presentations

- Archivist Deena Schwimmer presented a lunchtime learning session on her presentation to the 2021 Association of Jewish Libraries conference on the COVID Collection.
- Curator Shulamith Berger represented Yeshiva University in a recorded panel discussion on *Confronting Anti-Semitism* at the Center for Jewish History.

Classes

Curator Shulamith Berger presented rare Sephardic materials to students in Professor Ronnie Perelis's Sephardic history course.

Blog posts

Archivist Deena Schwimmer and Curator Shuli Berger contributed posts about rare manuscript, book, and archival material to the library blog.

WEB & DIGITAL SERVICES

- Migrated the library integrated system (Virtua) to vendor hosting in August.
- Assisted Information Technology Services in migrating all library servers to a new data center on the Resnick Campus.
- Upgraded EZProxy to Version 7.1.14 and switched to Proxy by Hostname to overcome incompatibility with many popular e-resource websites.
- Patched the Apache log4j vulnerability on all library servers.
- Installed and configured TrackRef, an open-source application, to use for recording reference interactions.
- Maintained the eReserves platform, on which 47,479 items were, a 9% increase from the prior year.
- Concentrated support of online graduate students through creation of eReserves Everspringdesigned courses (MSW, MBA, MSA, MSRE, and Katz Cybersecurity).

• Library Systems Administrator J.B. Holderness assisted in the virtual Mini-Symposium, and as coordinator of Lunchtime Learning, hosted three virtual sessions.

Technology Enhancement

- With support from the Zoltan Erenyi Fund
 - All Group Study Rooms in Pollack library are equipped with Flatscreen TVs.
 - A scanning table with the new overhead book scanner (Fujitsu ScanSnap SV600) was installed behind the circulation desk of the Pollack Library.
 - Six new Surface Go laptops were acquired and configured for use in the library laboratory.
- Four Bloomberg Terminals have been installed in Pollack library for Sy Syms School of Business students.

YAIR: Yeshiva Academic Institutional Repository

- 176,738 pages viewed in 2021 2022, a 50.6% increase from the previous year.
- 147 articles published by faculty and staff members posted.
- Eight videos of Library Book Talks posted, and 13 Videos of interdepartmental and crosscultural talks, a series of 'Crisis and Hope: YU Voices—Ukraine' posted.
- 25 doctoral dissertations and 54 honors theses/senior projects posted.
- 732 course syllabi added to the new syllabi collections for Yeshiva College and Stern College for Women.
- New features added to YAIR to highlight faculty scholarship: Altmetrics, ORCIDiD, citation, YU Faculty Page, Share widget, badges.
- Marketing and Communications adopted YAIR as its publication archiving repository.


